Hepatitis B (Hep.B) - Blood-Borne Diseases

Hep B is an infection of the liver caused by a virus. The virus is in the blood, semen, and vaginal fluids of a person who has the disease.

• Almost one-third of people with HB infection have no identified risk factors.

Risk Factors

- Infants exposed during child birth to mothers, who are carriers of HB, blood and body fluids,
- People at risk for infection by exposure to blood
- Infected body fluids in a mucous membrane (mouth or eyes) or on broken skin. It may be sexually transmitted through genital or anal contact with an infected person.
- Lack of immunization
- Exposure to a HB carrier
- Unprotected sexual activity
- Sharing injection drug equipment
- Accidental needle stick
- People on dialysis are considered at high risk.

What is the treatment?

There is no specific treatment for Hepatitis B. People with the disease need to rest and maintain a proper diet. Some people need to be hospitalized, and some will need to take a medication prescribed by their doctor. Alcohol should also be avoided.

How can Hepatitis B be prevented?

- Get a Hepatitis B vaccination
- HB vaccine is 95% to 100% effective pre-exposure.
- Reactions to HB vaccine are generally mild and transient and include: irritability, headache, fatigue, as well as pain and redness at the injection site
- Practice safe sex.
- Do not share needles, razors, toothbrushes, sexual toys, etc.
- Clean up spills of body fluids or blood of an infected person with a 1:10 solution of household bleach& water
- Use universal precautions when exposed to blood or body fluids
